Recently, employees of Goldman Sachs spent a day volunteering at the agency's Turrell Child Care & Early Learning Center by reading stories, doing activities and creating crafts with the children. The effort was part of Goldman Sachs' Community Team Works program.

This marked the second year in a row that Goldman Sachs employees spent a day volunteering at the Turrell Center. The great success of the first Community Team Works project inspired more to participate this year. A total of 20 Goldman Sachs employees participated – 80 percent of whom were returnees from the initial effort.

The 10-year-old Goldman Sachs Community Team Works program aims to give back to communities in which the firm operates. Projects are initiated and organized by employees.

Goldman Sachs employee Peter Koski was the catalyst for establishing the relationship with the agency. Mr. Koski felt New York City was well represented in Community Team Works projects but found that very few were based in Northern New Jersey.

An active community volunteer, Mr. Koski believes that "everyone should give back in one way or another, especially where people are in greatest need." To that end, Mr. Koski wrote the project proposal and organized the first Community Team Works Day last year, and coordinated

the implementation of the second program this year with co-captain Lisa Recupero.

"It was unbelievable how many of the kids remembered us and remembered which books we read to them last year; we were only there for one day and they remembered," Mr. Koski said.

In 2009, the relationship with Goldman Sachs Community Team Works will expand. The agency will become a Community Team Works Partner, which will allow the project to extend from a single day to multiple days over the course of several weeks.

### Help Wanted/Volunteer Opportunities

**Baby Basics Program** – This program provides formula and diapers to low-income parents of children ages birth through 2 years. Volunteers are needed at the Carlstadt location to help pack, shop, and distribute bags of items to families.

**Job Mentors** – Help a student learn about a career by taking him or her to work with you. He or she will "job shadow" you for a day, and learn about your profession.

**Life Skills Workshop** – Share your expertise in balancing a checkbook, managing a budget, dressing for a job interview or

preparing a nutritious dinner with the young people living in our group homes by conducting a life skills workshop.

**Elder Care** – The senior center in Garfield needs an attorney to discuss wills and other issues related to aging. The Garfield and Hackensack locations are seeking volunteers to teach computer skills and help lead a "Brain Games" class.

For four Saturdays last December, he and a colleague – fellow Reserve Sergeant Dan DeRienzo – teamed up together to present the first-ever “Coin Toss” for Children’s Aid and Family Services.

The two officers mobilized fellow Paramus Police Reserves officers on local street corners to seek donations from passing-by motorists. The funds were used to purchase gifts and gift-wrapping for children in the agency’s group homes. Sergeant Harrison recalls the children’s smiling faces

when the officers joined Santa to deliver the bag of gifts to the children using one of their patrol cars.

“The reaction from the children was priceless,” Sergeant Harrison said. “As soon as we walked in and saw the smiles on their faces – it meant so much to us to be able to help.”

Perhaps Santa’s elves will ask advice on how to deliver joy from the Paramus Police Reserves. Each holiday season, the unit sets aside time to conduct charitable work, and after this first successful interaction with the agency, Sergeant Harrison looks forward to future collaborations.

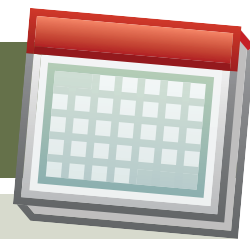
## The Depot: All Volunteers All the Time
